Becoming midwife

Midwives have a unique role working with women and their families. Midwifery relationships facilitate not only the physiological processes of pregnancy, giving birth and the initiation of the early mother-baby relationship; but also the growth and development of each woman who is preparing for her role as a parent.

As well as the satisfaction it brings, midwifery is demanding and carries plenty of responsibility and accountability. More midwives now work in the community, providing services in women's homes, local clinics, children's centres and GP surgeries. There is, of course, the option to be hospital-based, where there are plenty of opportunities for midwives to work on antenatal, labour and postnatal wards and neonatal units

Midwifery – 3 years BSc(Hons)

This course reflects the requirements of the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) and the NHS for the preparation of contemporary practitioners. The structure comprises a mixture of theory and clinical practice. The course is taught on the Eastbourne campus and placements take place in locations across Sussex including Hastings, Eastbourne, Brighton, Haywards Heath and Worthing.

Professional accreditation

Graduates are able to register as a midwife on NMC Midwives part of the register.

Course structure and organisation

Each year is divided into three terms, which include shared, common and midwifery-specific modules. Clinical midwifery practice modules run throughout the programme allowing you to prepare for practice situations in controlled settings and to integrate theory and practice. In the first year of the course you will be introduced to midwifery practice and its professional framework.

The second year introduces you to the concepts of abnormality in childbearing, focusing on the skills a midwife may require to support and care for a woman, her baby and family where additional needs are identified. The final year of the course provides you with an opportunity to develop your midwifery skills, working closely with other healthcare professionals and using evidence-based decision making to manage your clients care.

Midwifery – 18 months

BSc(Hons)

This course is designed for registered nurses on Part 1 of the NMC register. It examines the professional role and practice of the midwife and develops practitioners who recognise the unique relationship and partnership that exists between mother and midwife.

The underlying philosophy is one of valuing the midwifery profession, the students and the educational process. The course is offered in conjunction with local NHS Trusts in Brighton, Worthing, Haywards Heath, Eastbourne and Hastings. Students become employees of the respective trust, subject to contract and conditions of employment.

Professional accreditation

Graduates are able to register as a midwife on NMC Midwives part of the register.

Course structure and organisation

The course is divided into two stages.

Stage one – you are introduced to midwifery practice and its professional framework. Focus is placed on a midwife's role in promoting a positive childbirth experience.

You are introduced to the concept of personal development planning and encouraged to maintain your own portfolio.

Theory will be delivered in study blocks of 1, 2 or 3 weeks and practice placements are for 4, 5 or 6 weeks.

Stage two – you are introduced to the concepts of abnormality in childbearing, focusing on the skills a midwife may require to support and care for a woman, her baby and family where additional needs are identified. Theory and practice placements are the same as Stage 1.

The latter part of the course provides you with an opportunity to develop your midwifery skills, working closely with other healthcare professionals and using evidence-based decision making to manage your clients care and promote professional autonomy. You will be encouraged to carry a small caseload during this time. You will also have the opportunity to undertake a short placement in Europe.
