Getting to know us

The University of Brighton is a thriving academic community of over 21,000 students, including 3,500 who are studying at postgraduate level. There are approximately 1,200 international students from over 90 countries and a similar number from the European Union. This rich mixture of nationalities and cultural backgrounds gives the university a truly international and cosmopolitan feel.

We have a long history of providing specialist English language courses for a wide variety of clients. In particular, we specialise in English for Academic Purposes and courses linking English language and British culture with other specialisms such as business or language teaching.

Brighton and Hove is Britain's liveliest seaside city and offers an exciting mix of shops, restaurants, pubs, clubs and theatres. The campus itself lies just three

miles away from the city centre and is surrounded by beautiful countryside. A trip by train to London takes less than an hour and Gatwick Airport is only 30 minutes away.

Our English language programmes are accredited by the British Council and we are an institutional member of the British Association of Lecturers in English for Academic Purposes (BALEAP). Many of our English language teachers are experienced examiners having worked for examining bodies such as Cambridge ESOL and Trinity College.

Living and studying in Brighton

Although compact enough to walk around, there's as much happening in Brighton as there is in any major UK city outside of the capital. It combines the energy and cosmopolitan, contemporary feel of London with a laid-back, friendly atmosphere and sense of community. There are many sides to Brighton and something for everyone – from shopping and eating out, to music and the arts, entertainment and clubbing. It's a great place to be a student; in fact, around one in seven people living in Brighton is studying.

Beautiful and historic Regency architecture mixes with the iconic seaside attractions of the pier. And of course there's the beach: a theatre of dramatic scenery during winter and in the summer, a cross between a Mediterranean resort and a music festival.

Shopping and eating

With over 400 cafés and restaurants to choose from, you won't go hungry! Whether you like Indian or Greek, Mexican or Italian, vegetarian or seaside fish'n'chips, you'll find it here, and fierce competition keeps prices affordable. Relax with the newspapers and a coffee in one of the North Laine cafés.

Brighton is a shopper's paradise. As well as all the familiar high-street names around the city centre, there are many stylish,

independent shops in The Lanes. The North Laine is home to quirky specialist shops, selling everything from second-hand records and clothes to bric-a-brac and wholefoods, and you can head to the Marina for designer stores.

Entertainment and socialising

Social entertainment is an integral part of your university experience and the University of Brighton Students' Union (UBSU) provides a year-round programme of events including club nights, karaoke and cinema nights.

Various university societies also hold cultural and religious events for festivities such as Eid, Diwali, Hanukah, Chinese New Year and Christmas. Events run throughout the year and everyone is invited to get involved and be part of the action.

If you're a music lover, Brighton has it all. The venue for classical, jazz and world music is the Brighton Dome, home to the Brighton Philharmonic Orchestra, while the Brighton Centre stages major rock and pop gigs and there's live music in many clubs and pubs. In the summer there are concerts and mini-festivals in the city's parks and on the beachfront.

The highlight of the city's cultural year is the Brighton Festival. England's biggest arts

festival, held in May, showcases arts and performance from around the world. But Brighton's dynamic cultural life pulses all year round. The Brighton Dome performing arts complex, the Theatre Royal, the university's Sallis Benney Theatre and a huge number of smaller venues offer everything from pre-London productions to the avant garde.

For film fans there are three multiscreens and the Duke of York's arthouse cinema, and in the summer you can see film screenings on the beach.

Visual art is everywhere, from sculptures on the seafront to major exhibitions at the Brighton & Hove Museum and Art Gallery, the Hove Museum and Art Gallery, and at the university's own gallery. There's also a beachfront Artists' Quarter and an impressive number of smaller galleries to explore.

Sport and exercise

Whether you take your sport seriously or just want to keep fit, Brighton offers all kinds of opportunities and facilities, on and off campus.

Accommodation

The university can arrange or help you arrange accommodation for the duration of your study. The type of housing available



depends on which course you choose. This may be in our halls of residence; in university-managed accommodation; or with a host family. We can also put you in touch with private landlords whose accommodation meets our requirements in terms of both price and quality.

Study support

While you are studying on one of our English language programmes you will have full access to all of the facilities enjoyed by other students at the university. This includes a wide range of academic and personal support services as well as full use of libraries and computer systems. You will be given a university email address and you will be able to use our award-winning online learning environment, studentcentral.

You will be based in the School of Language, Literature and Communication which has a well-equipped self-access centre to help you with your language studies. Trained staff will be on hand to provide support and you will have access to a wide range of materials including audio, video and print.

English language support programme

If you start a degree course with us after completing your English studies, you will continue to receive high-quality language support. This is provided by our English language support programme which offers a series of term-time lectures, classes and tutorials and is available to all international students.

The programme is designed to consolidate and develop your existing language skills to help you complete your day-to-day academic English tasks. The courses are free of charge and are taught by staff from the School of Language, Literature and Communication.

The programme includes:

- Intensive English study weekends at the start of the academic year
- Academic support evening drop-in sessions
- Academic writing and writing style classes
- Academic skills evening lectures and classes.

Who is the course for?

The Extended Management Masters (EMMA) programme allows you to make a single application for a business masters degree and an English language course. You can typically obtain a single UK visa to cover both parts.

Depending on your current language level you will study English for between two and six months before starting your masters course.

The English study syllabus is designed to help you build up a strong business and academic vocabulary that specifically relates to your masters subject. You will have an opportunity to work with specialist tutors from your area of study before starting your 12-month masters degree.

The following University of Brighton masters courses are available as part of this programme:

- MBA
- MBA International Management

Course structure

You will have 20 hours of lessons per week with some afternoons free for directed self-study. Lessons normally take place between 9.30 and 13.00 in the morning and between 14.00 and 16.00 in the afternoon. English classes are taught in small groups of up to 16 students.

While you are studying English you will also attend business lectures at the business school. This will help you get used to academic life before starting your masters.

You will also need some time for private study. To help with this you will have full access to the university's library and computer facilities.

There are no lessons on UK national holidays.

Assessment

To progress to your masters degree you will need to pass the following assessments:

- Academic reading
- Essay and report writing
- Note-taking from lectures
- Presentations
- A portfolio to demonstrate your developing language learning and study skills.

This will be based near to the campus where you will be studying. You will have a single study bedroom with shower facilities in a shared apartment. Kitchen and laundry facilities are provided and meals are available on the university campus.

EMMA - Develop Your English

You will develop your level of general English and business vocabulary. This will provide you with a strong foundation for the next part of the course. The following topics will be covered using a range of business and general English materials:

- Reading, writing, listening and speaking
- Grammar review and vocabulary development
- Introduction to English for academic purposes
- Pronunciation practice
- Language learning strategies
- Guided self-study.

EMMA - Extend Your English

Through intensive study you will rapidly increase your confidence in spoken and written English and your knowledge of the UK business and academic environments. The following topics are studied:

General English

- Grammar review and vocabulary development
- Pronunciation practice
- Language learning strategies
- Guided self-study.

Who is the course for?

If you have an offer to study for a degree at the University of Brighton, this programme will help you improve your English before you start. (Note that business master students will normally follow the EMMA programme instead - see page 12).

Choosing this route has several advantages:

- You will not need to take another IELTS test. You can go straight from the pre-sessional course to your degree, providing you pass our assessments.
- The pre-sessional English courses are based at the university and taught by tutors who understand the skills and knowledge that you will need for academic success.
- The pre-sessional programme provides

an excellent opportunity to meet other students and get used to life in the UK before your degree starts.

If you have an unconditional offer to study for a degree at the University of Brighton, you can still join our pre-sessional programme. Many of our students choose to do this to boost their confidence in academic English before they start. The four-week programme is particularly suitable for this though you are welcome to register for the eight or 12-week course if you prefer.

Course structure

You will have 20 hours of lessons per week with some afternoons free for directed self-study. Lessons normally take place between 9.30 and 13.00 in the morning and between

14.00 and 16.00 in the afternoon. You will study mainly in small groups of up to 16 students.

You will also need some time for private study. To help with this you will have full access to the university's library and computer facilities.

There are no lessons on UK national holidays.

Assessment

At the end of each four-week section you will need to pass the following tests before you can progress:

- Pre-sessional – Develop Your English
- Language structure test

For assessment you will produce a portfolio of work to demonstrate your developing language learning and study skills. You will also take a written test at the end of each 10-week section which you will need to pass in order to move on to the next stage.

At the end of the EAS – Consolidate Your English section you will write an assignment and give a presentation. If you successfully complete the tests you will receive a certificate – this may allow you to progress to a University of Brighton degree course without taking an IELTS test.
